OVERVIEW

The Need

Join IMR on the inaugural mission to Santa Cruz, Bolivia. Physicians, mid-level providers, nurses, CNA's, EMTs, paramedics, and non medicals are welcome to participate in this amazing outreach.

The Santa Cruz region in Bolivia faces significant healthcare challenges that require immediate and sustained attention. Rural areas such as La Guardia, San Carlos, and Santa Rosa have limited access to essential medical services. There is only one General Practice Physician per every 3,200 inhabitants in San Carlos, highlighting the severe shortage of healthcare professionals.

The region is plagued by chronic diseases such as cancers, with cervical, prostate, and breast cancers being particularly prevalent. Cervical cancer alone accounts for 22% of all female cancer cases. Infectious diseases like malaria, Chagas disease, dengue fever, and yellow fever are common due to inadequate

sanitation and medical services in rural areas. For instance, Chagas disease is highly prevalent in Bolivia, with the Santa Cruz Department having one of the highest infection rates among women of reproductive age.

The healthcare infrastructure is insufficient to make the gains they desire and there is a shortage of medical personnel, medicines, and hospital beds, exacerbated by multiple factors.

Many households face catastrophic health expenditures, with many households across Bolivia experiencing financial hardship due to health costs each year. This is particularly true for indigenous communities and informal laborers who lack health insurance coverage.

Maternal and child healthcare is another critical area. Congenital Chagas disease is a significant concern, with high infection prevalence among women of reproductive age.

HIV/AIDS prevalence is higher among certain populations. Other infectious diseases like leptospirosis, hepatitis A, and typhoid fever are also prevalent due to poor sanitation and limited medical services.

Our Work

IMR has been approached to conduct day clinics in schools and community centers to focus on preventive work, ensuring early diagnosis and treatment of common health issues. As with all of our work around the globe, education is key to multiplying impact. Local caregivers, providers, nurses and educators, will join us and learn components on how to stay healthy and care for their loved ones, focusing on preventive care and healthy lifestyles. By engaging local clinicians, IMR can train local healthcare professionals to enhance the capacity of the existing healthcare system.

Engagement of the community is imperative. IMR will work closely with local communities, including indigenous populations, to raise awareness about health issues and promote culturally appropriate health services.

With diligent planning and preparation, IMR is dedicated to ensuring that specific goals are met on our missions, each in correlation to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals 3, 6, and 17.

IMR works to elevate vulnerable populations through shoulder-to-shoulder care with our local partners, creating workforce density, and a cadre of future healthcare and public health leaders in association to UNSDG 3: Good Health & Wellbeing.

Our medical mission teams also work toward UNSDG 6: Clean Water & Sanitation by supporting and strengthening the participation of local communities in improving their water quality, and installing water filtration systems that supply communities with clean drinking water and providing education on hydration and

hygiene.

In correlation with UNSDG 17: Partnerships for the Goals, our organization works in collaboration and at the request of local hosts where we are under their direct influence and affluence. IMR never goes into a country without a formal invitation where there is a great community need for medical or dental care, and health education.

Santa Cruz, Bolivia, is a city nestled in the heart of South America, known for its rich cultural heritage and diverse population. With a metropolitan area population of approximately 1.856 million people, Santa Cruz is the largest city in Bolivia, boasting a unique blend of mestizo, Spanish, and indigenous identities.

The city and its surrounding communities suffer from a shortage of healthcare professionals, with only one General Practice Physician per every 3,200 inhabitants in some areas.

Chronic and infectious diseases are prevalent, with cancers such as cervical, prostate, and breast cancers being major health concerns. Infectious diseases like malaria, Chagas disease, and dengue fever also pose significant health risks due to inadequate sanitation and medical services.

The region lacks adequate healthcare infrastructure, with limited hospital beds, medical equipment, and specialized services. Arrivals and Orientation

You and the team will fly into Viru Viru International Airport (VVI) in Santa Cruz de la Sierra. Upon arrival, your team will transport to your accommodations in Ibarra where you can check in and freshen up. You will enjoy a hearty dinner and attend the team orientation to prepare you for the upcoming week of clinic. Your

team leader will assign roles for clinic, address IMR's clinic protocols, and discuss the communities you will be serving in and around Santa Cruz.

Monday, March 30, 2026

Clinic

After a hearty breakfast of local cuisine at your hotel, you will head to your first day of clinic! Patients of all ages will be lined up to greet you as the team arrives, excited to receive the medical care that is so difficult for many of them to attain.

Tuesday, March 31, 2026

Clinic

You will likely see many patients living with diabetes and heart disease. Not only can you offer treatment for acute symptoms, you will have the opportunity to provide patients with education on their conditions and the lifestyle changes that can help improve them.

Wednesday, April 1, 2026

Optional Training Day/Free Day

You and team will have the opportunity to provide training for local healthcare providers to continue IMR's long-term, sustainable education efforts. Education is as important as medical and dental care for our patients. Each clinic includes basic health education according to the specialties and skills of the IMR volunteers, as well as the needs of the local people. When communities become empowered to take health and wellness issues into their own hands, they become self-sufficient. IMR provides learning opportunities for the local communities through classes and hands-on learning to sustain their well-being beyond our visit. You will also have free time to explore Santa Cruz with its quaint historic streets and colorful architecture. There are so many things to do and see, it will be easy to get completely absorbed by the culture of this wonderful city.

Thursday, April 2, 2026

Clinic

Bolivia's health care system is saturated with people seeking care, making it difficult and sometimes impossible for the people with low income to receive the attention they need. Many do not seek much needed medical attention for reasons such as economical, transportation mobilization, and beliefs. The people choose to live with illness, pain, and other medical pathologies without the possibility of consulting a physician and instead use nothing or only traditional medicine. You will make a difference in their quality of life!

Friday, April 3, 2026

Clinic

On your final day of clinic you'll likely reflect back on all those whose lives you touched during the week – and the lives that touched yours. Your patients will be grateful for the care and education you provided throughout the week, and we thank you for your service.

Saturday, April 4, 2026

Departures

You will have one final breakfast with the team before your departure. If you are heading home today, you may schedule your flight for any time you wish.
